Erie To Cut Schedule All Along Line Here

Englewood will be represented by officials as well as by commuters at the citizens' meeting that has been called by the mayor of Leonia in protest to the proposed curtailment in train service that the Erie Railroad has announced for its Northern New Jersey Branch.

To Englewood the new schedule which is to go into effect on April 24 will mean the loss of five trains from Jersey City and of three to Jersey City.

This is the second change the Erie has instituted on the branch that operates between Newark and Jersey City. Last fall the railroad did away with double-track service from Tenafly north, making changes in schedule to conform with the reduced facilities.

Five Objectors Heard As Palisades Park Budget Is Passed

\$10,000 Increase In Amount To Be Raised by Taxes

The 1938 budget in the amount of \$121,775.48 to be raised by direct taxation as compared with \$111,322.94 in 1937 was passed on final hearing by the Mayor and Council of Palisades Park. Objectors were made by Democratic Municipal Chairman Grover C. Oberle, former Chairman Truesler Louis Struwer, Carl Van Hartman, Mrs. Anna Strachan and A. J. Fields. Mayor Carl E. Hider also arose to speak but when questioned as to whether he was a taxpayer, he sat down and did not present his protest.

Councilman Peter A. Backstrom, president of the council, presided in the absence of Mayor Adolph Krembel, who was ill. John J. Dickson, president of the Palisades Park Republican Club congratulated the council on its ability to keep the rate increase limited to 8 per cent. The average tax rate jump in 1937 of the county municipalities is 29 points, he said. Palisades Park's tax rate will be 5.49 compared with 5.43 of last year.

Questions Foreclosure Item

The principal objection came from A. J. Fields of Eighth Street who contended that the appropriation for tax lien foreclosures was unreasonable high and more than the people could afford to pay for.

Woman Maimed In Attack By Four Dogs

Mrs. Clementine Gruen, 41, of 424 East Central boulevard, Palisades Park was horribly injured as the result of an attack by four German boxer dogs, Monday afternoon in front of her home. The woman, badly torn from the side of her head to her legs, was taken to Holy Name Hospital after she was given first aid treatment by Police Surgeon Joseph Pedevill. At the hospital it was said she will recover.

Police said Mrs. Gruen and her husband, William, have been raising German boxer dogs for about a year. Up to Monday they had seven, three of them pups.

The heaviest dog, said to weigh about 80 pounds, and believed to be the leader of the pack, is reported to have been imported from Germany only a few weeks ago.

Knocked Down

The attack began in the home when Mrs. Gruen was alone. She ran to the street screaming for help, but was knocked down before aid arrived. Neighbors telephoned the police. Patrolman George Farrell arrived and fired a shot from his service revolver. This frightened the dogs somewhat, but only for a moment, when they resumed the attack. Several shots were fired before the animals were frightened off. Despite her terrible injuries Mrs. Gruen pleaded with police not to shoot her dogs, saying "she would rather die than have them shot."

While the woman was being taken to the hospital, Police Chief David Bell assisted by Fort Lee and Ridgefield Police led in the search for the animals. One was shot during the attack and the other knocked down during the fight ran onto the highway where it was struck by a truck. Both animals killed are females. The leader of the pack was caught late in the evening by Gruen. The other dog was still at large.

Tax Delinquent Farms One-Fifth State's Area

An immediate investigation to be followed by remedial legislation to remove the more common sources of rural tax delinquency now chargeable against nearly one-fifth of the entire area of the State, is being recommended by the New Jersey State Planning Board in a report presented by Chairman Charles P. Messick to Governor Moore and the Legislature today.

The report is of a survey made by the Planning Board of tax delinquency on rural lands for one year or more as of January 1, 1936. It revealed that some 900,000 acres, or 18.5 per cent of New Jersey, were tax delinquent for one or more years. While some delinquencies were voluntary, misuse of land, unproductive land, and attempts to cultivate unprofitable soil were found to be chiefly responsible.

The board recommends:

State acquisition of certain sub-marginal lands for public purposes. Revision of tax rates and assessment procedure.

Legislation making mandatory tax sales within a reasonable period effective through penalty provisions. Reduction in the costs of acquiring clear title to tax delinquent land.

Public information regarding soil potentialities for benefit of prospective purchasers of farms.

Governor Favors Princeton Survey Bills

New support for the four "foundation" legislative proposals of the Princeton Local Government Survey developed this week when Governor A. Harry Moore expressed the hope that "the principles embodied in the Princeton proposals will be made the subject of definite and early action at this session of the Legislature."

"If I can help to this end, I will do so," Governor Moore declared in a letter to DeWitt D. Barlow, Mayor of Plainfield and chairman of the New Jersey Citizens' Committee for the Survey, released here today by Barlow.

The four Princeton proposals, aimed to bring new control to municipal financial affairs and which Dr. Harold W. Dodds, president of Princeton, estimated would save \$25,000,000 annually for New Jersey taxpayers when fully effective, are now in the hands of the assembly judiciary committee.

Leonia Redistricting Comparatively Easy

With the number of election districts having been increased by three only two years ago, the introduction of voting machines in the county has compelled the Leonia council to revert back to the original four districts.

Councilman Charles A. Anderson has presented a tentative plan in which the four districts will comprise the extreme south and north ends of the borough, with the center section divided into two districts.

All districts will extend from the west to east boundaries and will contain about 800 voters.

It is in an effort to perpetuate this happy state of affairs that the Englewood Boy Scouts, with the cooperation of the Englewood police and junior police are sponsoring Safety Education Week here beginning on Saturday.

This week posters and literature have been distributed and on Saturday will start a week of events, outlined in full elsewhere in this issue, that will attract the attention of young and old and illustrate in a graphic way the factors which contribute to safety or lack of it.

Since Englewood is a comparatively safe place for children, our chief interest will be how to keep it that way.

An Apartment Hotel for Englewood

From time to time the subject is broached that Englewood could and would support a high class apartment hotel. There is a demand here for the type of living accommodations an apartment hotel affords, that is, furnished apartments with maid and restaurant service, in addition to rooms for transient guests.

There are many persons living in Englewood, maintaining living quarters of one kind or another, who would reserve hotel accommodations as soon as plans were drawn, and there are many others who would come here if such facilities were available. Furthermore, there are countless persons visiting in New York City or in nearby suburban communities who would prefer to stop at a hotel in Englewood than in Manhattan, especially since Englewood is so readily accessible to any point in Greater New York.

As an added inducement, there would be sufficient demand by local, suburban and metropolitan groups to warrant including in such a project a dining room seating 100 or 150 guests.

If enough persons in Englewood and adjacent communities show an interest in an apartment hotel, either as prospective permanent or occasional guests, it is more than likely that persons experienced in the hotel field would quickly interest themselves in the project.

Threat of "Sponsored" Movies

Scouting a ready source of additional income, film moguls are said to be sending out feelers on the possibility of working in advertising gags in feature pictures or presenting sponsored films. There is no doubt but that it will be done, would have been done long ago, in fact, if the film industry could get away with it.

Radio advertising is tolerated because it is free, and if objectionable, it can be turned off. A person going into a theater, however, pays for admission, goes for entertainment and is entitled to just that. There have been advertising stunts tried in movie theaters, and those who have had to sit through them will attest that they are boring, annoying and cheap, and far more objectionable for the most part than the double feature or any of the other movie evils that have been crusaded against.

You to whom movies are a principal source of entertainment and recreation should interest yourself in this movie advertising threat. Write to the Motion Picture Producers and Distributors of America (the Will Hayes office), 28 West 44th Street; the Motion Picture Theater Owners of America, 1600 Broadway, and the National Board of Review of Motion Pictures, 70 Fifth Avenue, all in New York City, and express your opinion that the movies should be kept scrupulously free from advertising, direct or indirect.

Colossal Tax Leakage

The startling revelation that tax delinquent farm lands constitute close to twenty per cent of the total area of New Jersey was made this week by the New Jersey State Planning Board of which Mrs. Edna B. Conklin of Bergen County is a member.

Add to this vast area (900,000 acres) of tax delinquent farm lands the total area of all other properties on which taxes are past due and you have an idea of the tremendous loss the state is suffering in potential tax revenue.

Until some organized effort, such as that recommended by the Planning Board, is made to restore such properties to the status of taxpayers; until the expense saving features of the Princeton Survey and other reputable investigations are tried, the public should, and we believe will, laugh to scorn any politician who suggests that new taxes must be found to meet the State's obligations.

Restoring tax delinquent properties to the role of taxpayers as required by law will go far towards "broadening the tax base", as Harold Hoffman used to express it, and this added income, plus the millions that can be saved by proper governmental reorganization will provide funds ample not only to meet relief and other necessary costs, but to reduce taxes besides.
